








### **CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE**



My family has for generations been involved in shipping and the Arctic. I was four years old when I stood on a ship sailing in Arctic waters for the first time in my life.

Since then, I worked in various companies involved with the shipping, international trade and Arctic development: from the Far East Shipping Company (FESCO) to Sovcomflot and now in Novatek. Throughout that period, international collaboration has been the core of the work.

The maritime transportation and most other industries in the North are by nature international and depend on collaboration. Today, 90% of all goods are transported by the ocean.

The Arctic sailing routes connect Russia with the Nordics and north America, but it also bridges major economies, providing short and efficient transportation. In the future we see a huge potential in expanding the shipments on the Northern Sea Route.

It was this international background that motivated me to be involved in the creation of the Arctic Economic Council while I was working at Sovcomflot. I have been a member of the executive committee since AEC's creation in 2014, so it has been a great honour to serve as a chair during the first year of the Russian chairmanship of the organisation. A year that has not been easy for many companies but where we have overcome many challenges.

The AEC chairmanship mirrors the chairmanship of the Arctic Council. The two councils have been very supportive in promoting sustainable economic development in the Arctic.

Yet, the AEC has truly proved its independence as a business organisation. Today when the work of most of the Arctic cooperation institutions has been put on pause, AEC remains to be functional.

The Arctic region has always been a region of low tension and an area of collaboration across countries. In turbulent times the communities and businesses in the North feel the impact the most.



### **CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE**

Here cross-border collaboration often is the key for economic development and the solution to overcome economy of scale. Small border towns feel the impact hard and indigenous communities are affected as well as families and friends.

Early this year we did a survey among AEC members. One of the questions we asked was about the biggest obstacles to sustainable economic development in the region.

The most frequent answer was the ambition to keep the Arctic region untouched. In recent years we have seen companies calling to stop transhipments in the Arctic ocean, large renewable energy projects being blocked and banks, pension funds and investors discriminating against energy projects within the Arctic region.

We must ensure to protect while at the same time develop the Arctic.

Novatek, that I represent, is an international company, working from Russia but in partnership with companies from countries like France, China, Japan, Finland, Singapore, South Korea and Germany. The Arctic is the global meeting place for the business.

Often we hear a lot of talk about people wanting to develop the Arctic. I am proud to say, that while people talk, AEC members are actually doing the great job each day to develop the region sustainably.

#### The AEC's role

The Norwegian poet Rolf Jacobsen writes in his book "Night Open" a poem titled "North" where he calls to the readers "to look more often towards the north" because "most of the country [Norway] is north".

Today, it is a kind reminder to people in the south to look up north because this vast region has the solutions to a lot of the challenges of our time. In the north you find plentiful of energy, raw materials and food resources.

The past year has been an eventful for the Arctic Economic Council. In 2021, the AEC celebrated its seventh anniversary while the Arctic Council celebrated its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The AEC has been involved in activities in and outside the Arctic and has never been more active in our outreach.

Over the years, the role of the AEC has sharpened and today we focus on three things: policy advocacy, networking, and outreach.

#### Strengthening policy advocacy

Since the establishment of the AEC more than a dozen of national Arctic strategies from around the world recognised our organisation as an important stakeholder and platform for promoting sustainable economic development in the region.

In 2021, countries like the Netherlands, Finland, Iceland, Poland as well as European Union highlighted the role of the AEC in their policies and some encouraged more companies operating in the Arctic to join the AEC. Most recently India and France have also released Arctic policy documents mentioning the AEC.

The importance of cooperation with the AEC was also stated in the 2030 Strategy of the Arctic Council that was released in May 2021.

In the past year we have gotten closer to the work of the Arctic Council both through joint meetings and through engaging with the Arctic Council working groups even closer than ever before.

### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE**

#### **Growing network**

Networking is the second focus area of the AEC and at times it can be the most difficult because our membership covers more than 10 countries and almost all time zones. One thing we have learned in the past years is the better use of online meetings.

AEC is building up connections both within its five working groups as well as meeting at international events on the Arctic.

Network is also growing our membership base. Since the beginning of 2021 AEC has welcomed 14 new members from several countries and various economic sectors; connectivity, energy production, consulting, tourism, and engineering.

#### **Expanding outreach**

Diversifying the image of the Arctic region is one of the roles of the AEC. The region is more than just snow, northern lights and polar bears, it is also a place where people live and work.

We have never been more involved in outreach and communication than in the past year, mainly due to the massive increase in online participation in conferences.

To strengthen all the work above, within policy advocacy, networking and communication, we need the immense knowhow from our members. If there is a policy challenge that the AEC can help with, if you need to establish contacts abroad or within a sector or if you have a good case that you want to share, then don't hesitate to reach out.

#### Way forward

I have now been in the position as executive director of the AEC for a year, and I continue to be impressed by the work of all AEC members. Last year was not an easy one for many companies with a pandemic and supply chain challenges to deal with.

There are still uncertainties and challenging times ahead for many companies, but the past years have shown the strong resilience and innovative solutions from companies. A new challenge for companies as well as the AEC is the war in Ukraine. This has an impact on our activity where, for example, the Arctic Council have paused their work. The AEC has been clear in its statements and actions from the beginning.

The Arctic has emerged and is taking its place on the international stage. The region is no longer separated or isolated from international politics but is a part of the global arena. The Arctic is feeling the effects of the same megatrends of changing demographics, digitalisation, urbanization and of course climate change, as the rest of the globe.

The Arctic of tomorrow will be different than yesterday. We have to shape the Arctic of tomorrow, today.

FINANCING THE FUTURE

Invest in Arctic solutions for global green transformation

The Arctic is a unique place to do business. The region spans from Alaska in the USA, over Canada, Greenland, Iceland, the northern parts of Scandinavia to the large parts of Russia. This enormous landmass is home to around four million people that both live in larger cities like Tromsø, Murmansk, and Rovaniemi and in more small and remote indigenous communities.

The recent UN Climate report stated that temperatures in the Arctic are rising at three times the world average. Yet, the reason for global warming does not originate from the region where very few heavy industries are located. Restraining from investments and economic development is not solving any problems.

If one takes a closer look, one can see that the Arctic holds solutions to the challenges we are facing today as a planet.

The Arctic Ocean is one of the few places where fish stocks are in good health and sustainably managed. Fishing and aquaculture can feed a growing population that, as of today, gets less than 7 percent of its protein intake from seafood. The Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations) estimates that 35 percent of the global harvest is wasted. Arctic innovations in bioeconomy are addressing this problem by developing commercially valuable products from what we traditionally considered as waste.

### **AEC STATEMENT ON UKRAINE**

#### Issued on 1st of March 2022

The Arctic Economic Council held an extraordinary Executive Committee meeting on Monday and decided to move the hybrid annual general meeting from St Petersburg to an online meeting.

Executive director Mads Qvist Frederiksen states that "Arctic Economic Council condemns the invasion of Ukraine by Russia. The Arctic Economic Council supports peace and democracy and we deplore the loss of life and the human suffering."

The Arctic Economic Council was created with inspiration from the Arctic Council as a place of dialogue between nations and people in the north. For centuries people have traded and travelled across the borders in the region.

The Arctic identity brings us together both in private and work contexts and therefore it has often been known as the region of high north – low tension.

Four out of five members of the Executive Committee voted in favour of the condemnation of the invasion.
